Thomas Codner of Iplepen, bachelor, son of Robert and Elizabeth Codner; baptized there 27 April 1764; Marldon 29 December 1788.

Jacob Bartlett of West Teignmouth, mariner, born and baptized at Marldon 23 December 1771. (d)

Jacob Bartlett, baptized at Marldon 30 May 1793; described in the burial entry of his first son named John and in the baptismal entry of his son James as "Captain" Bartlett; died between 7 November 1783 and 28 June 1785, as his daughter Mary is described in burial entry as daughter of Margaret Bartlett. Query buried in Newfoundland. [See also probate of brother Thomas's will.]

John Bartlett, born 11 November, and baptized at Marldon 16 November 1777; buried there 12 August 1778.

John Bartlett, born 6 December 1783, and baptized at Marldon 4 January 1788; bur. there 23 June of James Bartlett, 3 July 1783.

John Bartlett, born 24 January, and baptized at Marldon 18 February 1780. (d)

Mary Bartlett, born 6 December 1783, and baptized at Marldon 4 January 1788; bur. there 23 June of James Bartlett, 3 July 1783.

James Tucker Bartlett, born 18 October, and baptized at Marldon 7 November 1788; bur. there under name of James Bartlett, 3 July 1783.

Mary Ann Coster, daughter of William Squarey of Teignmouth and Mary Ann his wife; married at Guernsey 7 Aug. 1830; survived her husband and married Rev. Samuel Harvey, a Wiltshire clergyman, 20 June 1855. She is now dead.

William Beard Bartlett, born and died at Starcross 3 September 1804.

Thomas Harris of Teignmouth, married 6 December 1838 at East Teignmouth; died 25 May 1897; buried at the Cemetery, Teignmouth.

Elizabeth Beard Bartlett, baptized 29 May 1806 at Kenton; died at Teignmouth 14 September 1889; bur. at the Cemetery, M.I. Teignmouth.

Frederick Joseph Bartlett, master mariner, born 31 October 1809, and bapt. at West Teignmouth 26 July 1810; died at Liverpool 19 Feb. 1880 intestate; bur. at Toxteth Park Cemetery.

Orlando Joseph Bartlett, born November 1821; buried at Zion Congregational Chapel, Teignmouth, 15 February 1824. M.I.

William Edwin Bartlett, baptized at West Teignmouth 26 month 7 August 1817.

Have searched for the name TUCKER without result. (Including Family Names of the ~~British~~ Island of Newfoundland (Memorial Unit. of Newfoundland 1977) A possible "guess" could it have been TUCKER, badly written in register?

Thank you for your letter of 8th. September 1980,
and the information circular.

I am concerned with a family of BARTLETT, who as far as I know, did
not settle in Newfoundland. Particulars as follow:

Captain JACOB BARTLETT.....M..... MARGARET ?
bapt. at Marlton, Devon. in Newfoundland
30th. May 1735. (a pedigree
of his father's line on
record at College of Arms,
but not brought later up-to-
date.

Captain Bartlett's exact
date of death uncertain,
but is presumed to probably
(from other evidence) to
have been between 7th. Nov.
1788 and 23rd. June 1785,
and an unrecorded pedigree,
says: "Query buried in
Newfoundland.

Issue of the above marriage was six boys, 3 girls, all presumably
born in Devon, England, and (except the oldest bapt. at St. Mary, Church)
Devon, bapt at Marlton Devon. The one I am interested in is the
second son: JACOB BARTLETT, younger, bapt. at Marlton 25th. Dec. 1771,
but later described as of West Teignmouth, mariner. (it is possible
he was later a "master-mariner."?)
It is presumed he married and had issue. Did he marry in Newfoundland?
Anyhow it is generally presumed any issue were born in Devon.

WEST TEIGNMOUTH, Devon. Is evidently the principal port association,
but I suspect that they may have sailed out of other Devon ports as
well including PLYMOUTH after possibly 1800, or even before that.

Unusual names that might give clues: TUCIER, second name of
Captain Jacob & Margarets, youngest son.
SULTZER could possibly be the maiden name of the younger Jacob's
wife.

the Dorset branch of Bridport (the famous Captain Bob's family.)
As far as I know, no direct connection with the Marldon, Devon
Bartletts in the 1500, 1600 and 1700s. But I think a connection probably
in the 1400s, and a common origin back in the 1300s. A bit speculative
but I think probable.)

I would be interested to know any BARTLETT ship names. Some I know
were family owned. This research is, as you probably know, much
hampered by the Wills and other Devon records that that were lost in
the blitz of Exeter, World War II.

Dear Vicar:

A good many years ago I started researching my maternal Bartlett ancestry and when I was in the U.K. earlier in World War II, I wrote to the then Vicar of Marldon, who was most kind, writing me a long letter (and from the particulars I had been able to give him said,) "Your ancestor is Jacob Bartlett born etc.etc." Dates and details approximately agreed with what I knew, so, of course, I accepted it as the end of the research. Then I went out to Italy, and at the end of the war just had a couple of weeks in the UK, en route back to Canada.

Later putting things together I realized some details did not add up. Since then I obtained the printed pedigrees of Bartlett of Marldon and of St. Mary Church, and have corresponded with a later Vicar of Marldon, and of E. & W. Teignmouth. However I have just been able to think that some of the information I am seeking is probably in your parish registers.

If you have been involved in Devon history, you will possibly know that the Bartletts had such a great affection for the name Jacob, that there were living at the same time a number of them of various generations and ~~some~~ relationships (all cousins of some degree, and instances of father and son both Jacob, as to make for great confusion. One of the lines that were not followed through in the printed pedigrees are the children of Captain Jacob Bartlett and his wife Margaret. What it says there is that his marriage may have been in Newfoundland, but records there are not helpful. It does however record that ~~he~~ they had nine children, seven of whom survived to adult age.

I think at some time he left the sea and settled on the land, and later described as yeoman.

Also I think it likely that MARGARET BARTLETT (wife of Captain Jacob - the elder, lived at Ipplepen and died there.

Also that the younger Jacob married and lived at Ipplepen and that there would be record of, possibly his marriage, and of baptism of his children there.

In particular I am looking for a JACOB SULTZER BARTLETT probably born circa 1811-13.

Anything you can give me of the record of the BARTLETT family in IPPLEPEN, would be appreciated. Thank you.

In reply to your letter of September 18th, I have checked the information in the 'name files' for material on Jacob Bartlett, as requested. As I believe I explained to you in my previous letter, the files are the private research papers of Dr. Keith Matthews who is presently on sabbatical leave in England, and as his research assistant I am not quite as familiar with the material as Dr. Matthews. However, having studied the file, I have compiled a list of vessels owned by persons of the name Jacob Bartlett, (see the enclosed). I realize that we are dealing with two people here but it is difficult to distinguish between the two. It seems that one was involved in the coastal trade, timber, coal etc, while the other was in the Newfoundland trade.

There was no record in the files of the marriage of Jacob Bartlett nor of any issue from a marriage.

It is quite possible that Dr. Matthews would be able to glean more information from the files, but he is not returning to Newfoundland until June 1981. However, if you would like to contact him after that date I am sure that he would be pleased to assist you further.

Dear Ms. Thomas:

First of all thank you so much for your letter of 24th. September 1980, with enclosure. It was very, very helpful; and I have delayed writing you again, because I have been studying what you sent in relation to what I have on file.

It is evident that Dr. Matthews has done some much needed work in relation to Devon maritime interests, that has not, as far as I know been put together by anyone else.

My efforts have been "hit-and-miss" in the special Bartlett history which is my interest. At one time I used to get to the UK every year, but what with church commitments and seeing relatives, my research was often limited to hasty "one day" efforts to a record office, and such like, and there is one problem in Devon that has eluded me for years. As I am now 73, and at present inflation costs, and unlikely to get to the UK again in the early foreseeable future. I am yet most anxious to get this problem cleared up: and I think it quite possible, that given what I do have: that it would come within the field of what Dr. Matthews is doing.

What I would like to do is write him; sending xerox of my material, and I would think with that before him; he could assess if it is something he could quite reasonably look at, or if not. Certainly much better when he is in the UK, than after he returns to Newfoundland.


Dear Rev. Rokeby-Thomas,
