Dear Ms. Mishet,

Thank you for your letter of June 5, 1981 regarding the 'Scoley' family of Trinity Bay. Our Census records for these years are not nominal. Most of our information is related to trade activities of various families and individuals. Our name file data indicates Scoleys in the Trinity Bay district as early as the 1740s. This does not mean they were not there earlier. A Joseph Scoley was listed as coming from Parthouth, Devoc. Male given names include: Thomas, Richard, Edward, John, William and Jasper. Richard Scoley married a Mary Barrett in Trinity (1762). Most of those individuals were located in and around Heart's Content, T.B., in the second half of the 18th century, which is not far Scom Heart's Delight.

I realize this does not help you much if relatives dil indeed owne to Newfoundland much later (1860s). It should give you a better perspective, however, to know that there were Socleys already in Trinity and that your ancestors probably came from the West Country, (possibly Devon). We would have no way of determining on which ship George, Ned, et al, arrived.

The Chisletts are a well established Trinity name, though we have little on them in our Name File records. There was a Caorge Chislett, of Trinity, trading at Romae Ray on the West Coast of Newloundhard as early as 1840.

We would be unable to construct a late 19th construct family tree of the type your letter suggests. You might contact the Newformilland Provincial Archives, St. John's, as they may be able to help you.

We are enclosing an invoice for \$20.00 to cover the cost of two bruns of research. We hope you find this information helpful.
