To all people...Know we that I, Thomas Whidler, of Blackhead in Conception Pay, Newfoundland, for and in consideration of the sum of five pounds five shillings, well and truly paid by Henry Abbott of Carbonear, Planter, have given, granted, bargained, sold unto him, the said Henry Abbott, a certain plantation in Carbonear, bounded to the east by Purnthead and to the westward by a plantation formerly called Stookeys [?], now occupied by Thomas Terry, containing two boats' rooms or more, formerly in the possession of Thomas Whidler's father. In witness whereof I have set my hand and seal the thirtieth day of Fovember in the twenty fourth wear of the reign of our Sovereign Lord, George the Second of Great Pritain, etc., King, and in they are of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and fifty.

I should also wish that my sons do not forget their aged aunts in England, and that they send them a few pounds whenever they can afford to do so. I wish also that my wife do live in the house with Ambrose, as she now enjoys, and to be sole mistress during her life.
