- I was born in East Allington. At 8 years I was bd. apprentice to Mr. John Prideaux of East Allington and served my time. I hired with Mr. Loye of Fallopit as a wkly servant and con't 6 months, then I served another two years at 2/6 per wk. Then I hired with Mr. Pinsent of Dartmouth for a fishing season to Labrador. I returned in October to my master as a daily labourer until May, then I hired with Mr. Pinson again for Labrador and returned in October to Mr. Hine at 2/6 per week until May. Then I returned with Mr. Pinsent to Labrador and returned again in October and married at Blackawton to Mary Bovey. I have gone two years since my marriage to Labrador and now I work as a daily labourer.

Born at Marlborough Head in N. America, at 11 years old entered
American Service as a common seaman and continued in that service till
21 years old - taken from an American ship and pressed on board Crescent,
frigate, for 7 years. Discharged and come to Totnes for 2 months.
Entered the Nfld service in the employ of Mr. Henry Holdsworth of
Dartmouth for four years, went to Mr. Henry Pinsent's employ and went
to Labrador for four years, then employed by Mr. Thomas Pinsent and
remained 5 months, returned to Totnes and resided there since 1816 - .

Sir Robert John Pinsent

Born at Port de Grave, Newfoundland, on 27 July 1834, son of Mr. Justice Robert John Pinsent, Judge of the Court of Labrador, and Louisa Broom Williams. He was educated at Harbour Grace Grammar School, entering the Law.

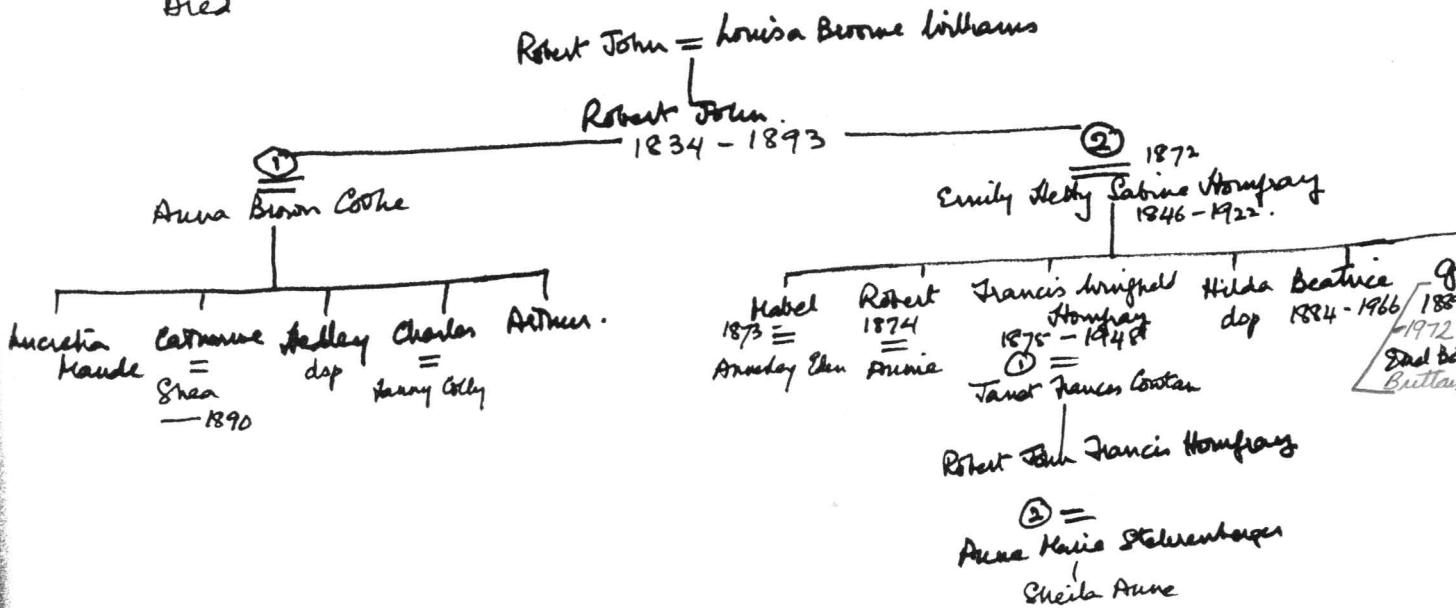
In April 1856 he married Anna Brown Cooke, daughter of Mr. J. R. M. Cooke, of Figuera, Merchant. He became a member of the Legislative Council in 1859 and Queens Counsel in 1865. There were two children of this marriage, which ended in divorce for desertion in 1870. Anna died in Queensland, Australia, in 1882.

In 1872 he married Emily Hetty Sabine Homfray, daughter of the Rev. Samuel Wingfield Clarke Homfray, Rector of Bintry, Norfolk. There were six children of this marriage. During a distinguished legal career he was knighted in 1890, but fell ill on returning to England after a visit to Rome. He died at Bintry on 27 April 1893.

PINSENT, Francis Wingfield Homfray, F.S.I. - District Valuer, Inland Revenue, Valuation Office, Plymouth, Devon, England. Born St.John's, Nfld. October 26th 1875, son of Sir Robert John Pinsent, Kt., D.C.L., Judge of Supreme Court of Newfoundland, and Lady Emily Hetty Sabine Pinsent. Educated at Bishop Feild and Method Colleges, St.John's and private tuition under Rev.T.W.Temple, St.Pierre and Miquelon. Entered Dept. of Agriculture and Mines, St.John's, Nfld., 1892. Resigned 1900. Entered office of Messrs. Viquers & Co., Chartered Surveyors, of 4 Frederick's Place, London, E.C. Passed Fellowship examination of the Surveyor's Institute, London, 1901, and was elected a Fellow in 1908. Subsequently entered into partnership and practiced as chartered surveyor and valuer in the city of London and accepted present appointment in 1910. Married April 22nd, 1911, to Miss Janet Francis Cowtan, of London, Eng. Children: One son, Robert John Frank Homfray. Society: Masonic, Sir Francis Drake Lodge, London. Club: 1894 Club, London. Recreations: Lawn tennis and golf. Religion: Church of England. Residence: Higherfield, Horrabridge, Devon, England.

After the death of his first wife on 14th February 1938 he married Anna Marie Stehrenberger, of Switzerland, having issue a daughter, Sheila Anne.

He died at Higherfield, Horrabridge on 23rd April 1948.

issue between Quebec and Newfoundland Labrador)

The boundary issue was, as Fraser points out (MacKay, R. ed.,
Newfoundland, economic, diplomatic and strategic studies, 1946
Oxford University Press, p. 463), first raised 'in a semi-academ
manner' by a Newfoundland judge in 1888. Mr. Justice Piusent then
pointed to a discrepancy between the extent of Newfoundland's
jurisdiction in Labrador as defined by the letters Patent of
28 March 1876 and as shown by a map published under the authority
of the Canadian Government. The judge urged that a practical and
essential problem arose in respect of the administration of
justice in the territory. He appealed to the then Governor to
seek some exact definition from the British Government. Efforts
were made at the abortive conferences at Halifax, Nova Scotia,
on confederation in 1888 and 1892 to resolve the matter. But even
an agreement reached at the latter meeting that the Newfoundland
and Canadian Governments should each appoint geographers to study
and to report on available documents on the boundary came to
nothing. The issue 'was at that time of little practical
importance'.
