## KEEN family - Dawlish.

In 1836 Captain ROBERT of Dawlish had died and his estate inxNewfour included a large amount of property in the towns of St Johns and Harbour Grace, Newfoundland. He must have been a descendent of a very prominent man in Newfoundland History. I refer to WILLIAM Keen of Boston in New England, who came to settle as a merchant and factor in St Johns around 1706. He played a very prominent role in Newfoundland see the "Dictionary of Canadian Biography" for the period, and while the chief magistrate of the Islands was murdered by robbers in 1754. He had a son WILLIAM, who moved the centre of his trade to Bonavista Bay in Northern Newfoundland, and who moved his family to TEICHMOUTH where he resided until his death in around 1776. He had two sons PENJAMAN and MANKER WILLIAM who carried on the trade for a few years. However William Keen junior was drowned while coming from Teignmouth to Newfoundland in about the year 1784, and the family wound it business up. However they continued to own the "plantations" from which their trade had been carried on, and leased to out to other merchants and fishermen. Captain Robert (above) must have been the son of either William or Benjamin. He had two sons apparently, William and Robert, and they continued to own the property at least up to 1860. For all that I know they may still possess it.
